Linking stakeholders in small communities spread across large geographic areas around a common goal and building the capacity to then carry out the needed actions are not without their challenges. This session features two current initiatives addressing different parts of this dynamic. Pennie Foster- Fishman will talk about how a project funded by the Michigan Endowment for Health enhanced an existing regional partnership to engage more than 200 rural health stakeholders. This effort developed a shared priorities	

300 rural health stakeholders. This effort developed a shared-priorities

framework to focus on upstream prevention activities that translated into a spate of new activities across Northern Michigan. Amy Elizondo of the National Rural Health Association will talk about a new and expanding effort to build capacity in high-need rural communities by embedding coaches in a rural organization for a year-long effort to help with strategic planning, partnership enhancement while also helping to identify funding and other resources to meet local needs.
